While they meander streets and gather in small clusters in the beautiful river town, these centuries' old residents will share stories about what it was like to face the all-too-real threat of pillaging, burning and looting by the English right here in Cecil County.

This year's event in Colonial Charlestown steps off at 4:30 and 6:30 p.m. on May 5. But after last year's program attracted 125 people, organizers have scaled things back a little in order to provide bet-

ter viewing and listening dur-ing performances. Each walk is limited to 50 strollers and the cost is \$10 in advance through the Wellwood Club or \$12 at the door. Leading up to this bicentennial activity, Susan Langley, the state underwater archaeologist will speak on maritime archaeology on the Chesapeake during the War of 1812. This free program, supported by the Maryland Humanities Commission and the

Maryland War of 1812 committee, takes place at the Historical Society on Saturday at 2 p.m. The society is located at 135 ET Main St. in Elkton.

The waters of the Chesapeake conceal many hidden treasures, and Langley will help us dive into the subject of those submerged cultural resources/ She describes the fascinating process of researching and excavating these artifacts, while investigating the sites of maritime battles. Over the years, her staff has worked on the Elk River a few times, exploring sunken War of 1812 myster ies. During one investigation in 1999, the researchers found a shipwreck site at the scene of a Cecil County skirmish at Frenchtownmas 2 shall

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
